RE: American Sign Language Subcommittee Final Report

During Fall 2015, a subcommittee of the University Undergraduate Curriculum Committee was constituted to explore American Sign Language as it relates to university policy. The subcommittee consisted of the following faculty/staff members:

Joseph Mazer, Chair (College of Architecture, Arts and Humanities)
Andrew Tyminski (Eugene T. Moore School of Education)
John Whitcomb (College of Health, Education and Human Development)
Stephen Fitzmaurice (College of Architecture, Arts and Humanities)
Margaret Camp (Student Disability Services)

Jeffrey Appling, Associate Dean of Undergraduate Studies, charged the subcommittee to:

1. Determine how ASL is presented in policy (e.g., when the university says that two years of a modern language is required for a BA, is the default position that ASL is in that list).
2. Provide some direction and maybe some stock language to allow departments/programs to express that ASL (or any other language) is not accepted for a requirement.
3. Provide any other recommendations that the committee thinks will make it easier for students and faculty to understand language requirements.

The subcommittee's review of the undergraduate catalog found significant inconsistencies regarding references to the language requirement in general. Specifically, "foreign language" and "modern language" are used interchangeably throughout the catalog and on program/major websites. This likely creates undue confusion for faculty, staff, and current and prospective students. After reviewing the undergraduate catalog and relevant websites and discussing options for addressing the charge, the subcommittee recommends the following:

1. Clemson University should adopt "Modern Languages" as the umbrella term for all languages taught at the university and accepted for transfer credit. This recommendation is consistent with recent disciplinary trends. The study of a modern language involves more than the study of the language but also the culture in which the language situates itself. One major goal of modern language education is to help guide students to employ critical thinking skills and view the world through the eyes of another. As many students find that studying an indigenous American language provides an entirely different lens

from which to view the American experience, the term “Modern Languages” has become a professional staple to replace older terminology such as foreign language study.

Therefore, all references to “foreign language” in the undergraduate catalog and on relevant websites and materials should be replaced with “modern language.” Modern languages taught at Clemson or accepted for transfer credit are: American Sign Language, Arabic, Chinese, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Latin, Portuguese, Russian, or Spanish.

2. Clemson University should recognize American Sign Language (ASL) as a modern language. This recommendation is consistent with the most recent disciplinary thinking on this matter. ASL has been offered as a course of study since 2000, and as a modern language major for the last six years. ASL has been linguistically recognized as a distinct language since the mid-1960s and includes all the properties of productivity, recursivity, and displacement required for any language. And, with a large community of users, ASL has a complex syntax that is independent from English embedded within a rich and vibrant culture. The Department of Languages unanimously believes ASL meets all modern language requirements campus-wide.
3. Near the general education program description on pages 38-39 (or in another section), the university should provide a formal statement on the “Modern Languages Requirement at Clemson University.” Such text might read:

Several Clemson University degree programs require the completion of a modern language through the 2020 course level. Modern languages taught at Clemson University or accepted for transfer credit include American Sign Language, Arabic, Chinese, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Latin, Portuguese, Russian, or Spanish. While many degree programs that require completion of a modern language accept any of the above languages for this requirement, certain programs may have specific modern languages requirements. Students should consult their major's curriculum map for details.

4. The above list of recognized modern languages would be considered for all majors that require a modern language through the 2020 level. Therefore, curriculum map footnotes that list all available languages can be deleted (see page 67 in undergraduate catalog for one example). Readers could be directed to the modern languages policy statement described above, if necessary.
5. If a specific degree program would like to exclude any language from the above list of recognized modern languages, that degree program could opt out of the above policy by providing such information in a footnote in the major's curriculum map (e.g., “American Sign Language does not count toward this major's Modern Language Requirement.”).

Cross-Cultural Awareness Requirement

This requirement will be met by selecting a course from the approved list of Cross Cultural Awareness (CCA) courses or through a University approved Cross Cultural experience. The selected course or experience may be incorporated in the six required credits in the Arts and Humanities, the six required credits in the Social Sciences, the three required credits in Science and Technology in Society, or as an additional requirement within the major.

Degree programs may select the context of their Cross Cultural Awareness course/experience in such a way that benefits the total curriculum.

Current Competency: demonstrate the ability to critically compare and contrast world cultures in historical and/or contemporary contexts.

Proposed Competency: explain how aspects of culture are integrated into a comprehensive worldview; and then demonstrate how culture influences human behavior.

Rationale for change: faculty reviewers of Clemson students' e-portfolio CCA artifacts have observed consistently that most students compare and contrast customs from various societies without really understanding how these cultural practices make sense within various cultures (typical: "Culture A does X behavior; Culture B does Y behavior.") Faculty reviewers have argued that such superficiality does not prepare students for functioning in a globalized world, and does not help students appreciate and respect cultural differences. Given Clemson University's 2020Forward emphasis on increasing our students' global awareness, and given Clemson's commitment to increasing student sensitivity to multiculturalism in the United States, it is time to revise the university's CCA requirement.

Explanation of terms: "Integrated" refers to the idea that aspects of cultures (e.g., belief systems, political systems, family concepts, historical events) systemically reinforce each other. "World view" refers to a culture's perspective on the physical, social, and supernatural realms of existence.

To qualify for CCA designation, courses should have an emphasis on non-U.S. cultures and courses should also be broadly-based, introductory level, and with general content. By the end of the course, students should also have a recognition of, and appreciation for, the fact that cultural differences exist.

Content and methods will be appropriate to the general education area in which the courses are offered.

Examples of artifacts: successful artifacts should demonstrate that students can relate a society's beliefs and practices to that society's culture (integrated world view).

Example 1: extensive maternity leave in European countries may be examined by relating the practice to economic systems, political systems, religious beliefs, cultural values, and historical events.

Example 2: Italian Renaissance art may be understood in relationship to political and economic conditions as well as to philosophical, religious and cultural values.

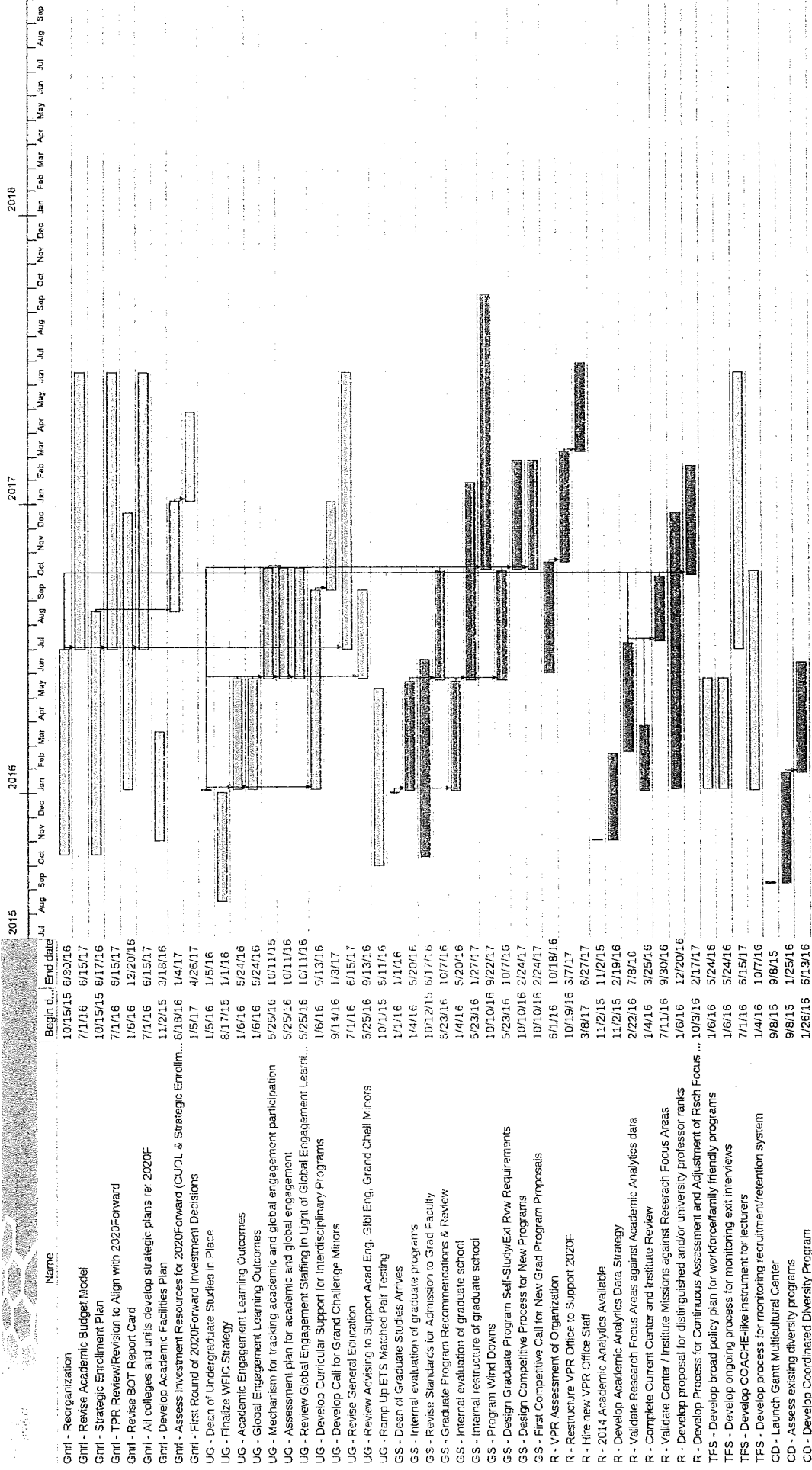
