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OVERVIEW



WHO WE ARE

The Writing Lab, once called the "writing center," is an instructional service and lab "space" that provides writing support to undergraduate and graduate students, faculty, and staff. We offer both face-toface and online consultations, as well as workshops for Clemson writers.

A BRIEF HISTORY

The Writing Lab was established in 1983 as an initiative to support students in ENGL 1030 courses. This first iteration of the Writing Lab was housed in Daniel Hall. As the Writing Lab grew, it began to provide writing feedback to students and staff across campus.

Around 1995, the Writing Lab changed its name to the "Writing Center," reflecting new conventions in writing center studies. The Writing Center moved into the newly-constructed Academic Success Center in 2012, where it remained until August 2022.

Now, the Writing Lab has returned to its original name, and we continue the Writing Lab's legacy of supporting writers in the Clemson Family in our new location in Cooper Library.

The Clemson Writing Lab seeks to create a supportive and critical space for the confident expression of individual voice through writing by providing an adaptable, inclusive, and trusted environment for all writers to grow and learn.

The Clemson Writing Lab aims to help students gain confidence in their writing, improve as communicators, and achieve their academic goals by providing highquality, effective services in a supportive, inclusive environment.

ETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

One of my mentors in graduate school was Dr. Terese Thonus. Dr. Thonus was director of the Writing Center at the University of Kansas. She hired me, saw potential in me, and never missed an opportunity to mentor me throughout the four years I worked on her staff. She gave me many opportunities to grow. Even after I graduated and she moved to another institution, Dr. Thonus remained a mentor, providing support as I worked to establish myself as a director in my own right. Much of how I lead the Writing Lab is influenced by the way I experienced her leadership. Dr. Thonus passed away in December 2022.

In June 2023, the Writing Lab lost a wonderful member of our community. Abena Ofori was someone I believe Dr. Thonus would have adored. Abena was passionate about helping others. She wanted to make a difference, and she was determined to do just that in the field of writing center theory and practice. The school year began somber, heavy with mourning. The task before us seemed monumental: remember Abena for all that she did, for all the impact she had, and for the legacy she left behind. A memorial was planned. A poster with her words was posted in the Writing Lab. Consultants, some of whom had never faced such a loss before, carried the weight of grief and the pressures of a new semester. One consultant, in a quiet conversation in my office, told me through tears: "We'll do it for her. We'll do our best for her." So, we did.

Colleagues from other institutions offered their condolences. Abena was memorialized at the Southeastern Writing Center Association Conference, a conference she planned to attend. We received flowers and occasional gifts from our friends at the Academic Success Center. We came together to remember. I think, really, that this year was a year of remembering where we have been, what we have lost, and envisioning where we can be and what we can gain.

In September 2023, we celebrated the 40th anniversary of the Writing Lab. That event was a practice in looking back to move forward. We learned more about the history of the Writing Lab. We celebrated where we've been. Likewise, we celebrated where we are going. Launching our Constellate strategic plan just before our anniversary was intentional, but I did not realize exactly how meaningful such timing would become.

This year has been one of transitions. The Writing Lab fully settled into its space within Cooper Library. A new cohort of ten Writing Fellows began their tenure. A student leadership position, Lead Writing Fellow, was launched. For the first time since 2020, student consultants presented at a conference. In a very successful partnership with the Graduate School, the Writing Lab hosted Writing Wednesdays for graduate students across the curriculum and more than doubled the number of graduate writing appointments. In April 2024, I received approval to begin slowly opening writing support appointments to alumni, a move toward the goals of the Constellate Strategic Plan.

Over the summer, I will be participating in the writing component of STEM Start. We will have two major graduate writing events and several undergraduate events focusing on major concerns we have seen in appointments. Likewise, we intend to host the 2025 South Carolina Writing Center Directors Day, inviting writing center directors from across the state to Clemson.

There are many exciting things ahead for the Writing Lab. As we pursue these things, we will always remember where we have been, who we have lost, and the legacy that we carry with us.

The Writing Lab began its mission in 1983. That mission was to support students enrolled in ENGL 1030 classes. The Writing Lab was located in Daniel Hall.



Around 1995, the Writing Lab changed its name to the "Writing Center." It also was staffed entirely by English MA students, who utilized a classroom in Daniel Hall.



With the formation of the Center for Professional Communication, the newly established Writing Fellows Program began providing writing support to students.



Space was secured in the Academic Success Center for the Writing Center. The Writing Fellows became part of the Writing Center and relocated to the ASC.



Outgrowing its space in the ASC, the Writing Lab moved to a 2x larger space in Cooper Library, allowing for further growth of Writing Lab services.

Group Sessions

This year, there were 30 group appointments. Many of these were student project groups from nursing and engineering.



Personal Statements

Medical, dental, and law school personal statements accounted for at least 14% of all appointments.



Lab reports accounted for about 12% of all appointments. Most of these were biology or chemistry reports. All Majors

All majors were represented about those 755 writers who utilized the Writing Lab this year.



Writing Fellows

Our staff of 11 Writing Fellows representing four different colleges worked with writers across the disciplines to support writers at various stages of the writing process.

Writing Fellows actively participated in the recruitment of five new Writing Fellows for the next academic year. This is in anticipation of growing usage in STEM fields and the graduation of three senior Writing Fellows.

Out of the 162 graduate student appointments, 83 listed the genre as "dissertation/thesis."

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ARTICLE PUBLICATION

46 appointments focused on revising an article for publication.



ACCOUNTABILITY PARTNERS

Several graduate students utilized Graduate Writing Consultants as structures to increase personal accountability. They often used appointments as benchmarks in their progress.



ALL STAGES OF THE WRITING PROCESS

Graduate students brought their work to the Writing Lab at various parts of the writing process.

GRADUATE WRITING CONSULTANTS



There were three Graduate Writing Consultants for the 2023-2024 AY. MacKenzie Croley (M.A. in English), Sage Short (M.A. in English) and Ruchika Muddinagiri (M.S. in Computer Science) received specialized training to support graduate students across the disciplines. Funding for the Graduate Writing Consultants was provided by the Graduate School. This funding has not yet been extended to the 2024-2025 Academic Year.

In Fall 2023, the Writing Lab began hosting "Writing Wednesdays." These weekly events provided dedicated time for graduate students across disciplines and levels to focus on their writing production. From 9am-11am, a Graduate Writing Consultant was available for questions and consultations.

Participants commented that these events were essential to their project completion, offering a sense of community in an otherwise isolating process.

Lab Reports

Collaborating with Dr. Chelsea McKelvey, the Writing Lab presented workshops on writing lab reports in biology and chemistry. The workshops were the most attended, resulting in 30+ students in attendance, most of whom scheduled subsequent appointments in the Writing Lab.

Dr. McKelvey approached the Writing Lab about hosting lab report workshops after hearing stories from students regarding their science writing anxieties.

RESEARCH AND PLANNING

In 2019, the Clemson Writing Lab began preparing for its certification bid. Center Acknowledgement & Recognition of Excellence through the Southeastern Writing Center Association demanded mission and vision statements, well-cultivated on-campus partnerships, a strategic plan, and robust training materials. All of these things did not exist prior to 2019.

BUILD STRONG RELATIONSHIPS

Over the course of four years, from 2019 to 2022, administration worked to create the required elements of a certifiable writing center, using this as an opportunity to revise old or disappeared practices within the Clemson Writing Lab. Students participated with the development of the statements and strategic plan.

DEVELOPMENT OF APPLICATION PACKET

The CARE application packet took one year to complete and revise. Letters were solicited from campus partners in support of the application, including Dr. Will Stockton and the Dean of the Libraries. Training materials and syllabi, letters providing institutional context, and a philosophy of consulting were all provided.

CERTIFICATION NOTIFICATION AND RECOGNITION

Although notified in August 2023, certification was officially conferred in February 2024 at the annual Southeastern Writing Center Association Conference.
